American rock icon, inducted into the American Songwriters Hall of Fame in 2005, best known as half of the rock and soul duo, Hall & Oates – **credits a Catawba Connection for Developing His Musical Style**

He shared the why of that story with a group of Catawba's music students when he visited campus on October 7.

When Oates was a seventh grader in Pennsylvania he had a good friend whose older brother went to college at Catawba. When the older brother came home to Pennsylvania for his first Christmas break, he brought with him "a big stack of folk albums," Oates explained, noting that in the 1960s there was a folk music renaissance in America, particularly in the South where folk root music began.

"I started hearing this music I'd never heard before," he said. "I read liner notes on the albums that included names of people like Joan Baez and Pete Seeger. I started to try to learn this music, playing and stopping the albums, and grabbing my guitar to try to recreate it. I spent literally a few months absorbing it. That music and those styles became an intrinsic part of my music and it opened up a world that I previously was ignorant of.

Oates, in town to play to a sold-out audience at Lee Street Theatre, is a friend of Bill Armour, Catawba's assistant to the president for special projects. He's also an advocate and supporter for Catawba's new Segue 61 certificate program in Nashville. That program, which launches January 7 with 18 talented students, will offer promising musicians, songwriters, producers/engineers and music business hopefuls from all genres an advantage in launching their careers.

Oates shared that he worked very hard in the 60s, 70s and 80s with musical partner Daryl Hall "to create a career and a legacy of music that was unique to us." The success of Hall and Oates through those three decades allowed him in the late 90s and early 2000s to begin solo work.

It was a chance for him to ponder: "What was it that made me want to become a musician – that made me separate and apart from Daryl?"

His pondering brought him back to folk root music, "the music that inspired me as a kid" and allowed him "to create something uniquely new and different than what I did with Daryl."

"Don't discount the early influences on you as musicians," he admonished the students listening.

While on campus, Catawba students in the Urb'n Sol group directed by Catawba alumnus and musician Dennis Reed '06 were able to perform for Oates and their fellow students gathered. They performed two original songs – Destiny Stone's "Colorblind" and Darryl Bell's "She's All That," before delighting Oates with their soulful take on Hall and Oates' "Sara Smile."

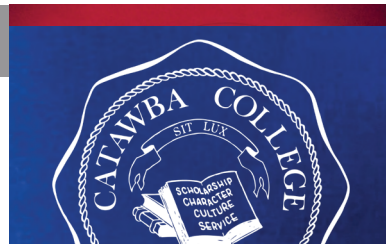

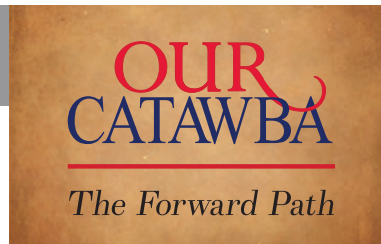

FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Catawba Community,

What makes your heart sing? For me, it is providing access to life-changing and life-shaping educational experiences. Of course, this is at the heart of Catawba's purpose.

This is an exciting time for the College! The Trustees have endorsed a new Strategic Planning initiative as we look toward the 2025-2026 Academic Year when we will reach two key milestones:

- **The Centennial of the College's location in Salisbury; and**
- **The College's 175th anniversary.**

It is instructive in undertaking Strategic Planning to review where we have been and where we currently stand. It may be helpful to use the analogy of the College being like an airplane.

Our current model is a relatively small plane with modest net revenue and not much diversity in what customers are paying. We are eager to have some revenue for a seat rather than an empty seat with no revenue at all. However, it is worth noting that unlike an airplane, we do have some additional costs if we fill the plane (such as hiring additional faculty to teach more first year English courses). We must be careful not to fill the plane but actually lose money by giving seats away at too low of a price. The future model for Catawba needs to be an airplane that is larger but also with greater diversity in ability and/or willingness to pay. We must be sure to maintain or even increase access for those unable to pay the "sticker price". At the same time, we must offer the level of quality at all levels that today's "travelers" expect to see, especially with so many options available. We must continue to improve what we provide and increase the number of needy students who can access it. In order to do that, we need to set an ambitious, even audacious goal:

I believe that this College should commit itself to achieving the goal, by the time of our 175th anniversary, of enrolling 2,400 students while enhancing our capacities to deliver our Mission and Core Values and increasing our commitment to access.

In doing so, we'll seek to initially target programs where we have some but not all the pieces to be distinctive, such as Environment, Business, Health Sciences, and Performing Arts, before moving on to other academic programs that are, or could be, distinctive within Catawba's liberal educational philosophy and experience. We will also strengthen the undergraduate experience within all academic programs by ensuring students have access to the quality 'high impact practices' identified by Dr. George Kuh (such as internships, study abroad, and undergraduate research, among others).

In addition, we need to establish key guideposts to set priorities. I will be welcoming input on what should be among these guideposts as part of the new Strategic Planning Initiative. Some elements I would encourage us to consider include:

- ✓ Remaining intimate: no classes over 40 and keep 15:1 student-faculty ratio;
- ✓ Extensively utilize all ten of Kuh's High Impact Practices; each student engages in at least seven of them;
- ✓ We're proud of our employees. Attract and retain them by meeting or exceeding competitive compensation benchmarks and engage in continuous professional development;
- ✓ Keep tuition under \$30,000;
- ✓ Retain NC as our #1 admissions priority and go interstate in targeted markets;
- ✓ Keep student services simple and user-friendly. Keep the family feeling in our campus atmosphere;
- ✓ Apply the "Disney Standard" to the campus: clean, no litter, outstanding landscaping, no deferred maintenance, no "backstage onstage";
- ✓ Any new degree program or co-curricular activity requiring additional staffing must generate surplus revenue within 24 months;
- ✓ If we are not proud of something we are doing, improve it to the point where we are proud of it within 24 months or stop doing it.

What elements on this list should be revised? Replaced? I look forward to dialogue with all members of the Catawba community on these topics.

The key question, of course, is how do we provide the resources to enable this growth? Clearly, it would need to be a combination of revenues from growth, gifts, and debt. There is no realistic way to develop the pipeline of students needed without some combination of all three.

Are there risks involved in this strategy? Of course. But it is just as risky – maybe more – to keep on our current path. We need to put the College in a position of strength for the next century for the benefit of our students and our community.

CATAWBA COLLEGE CATAPULTS AHEAD
IN 2017 U.S. NEWS BEST COLLEGES RANKINGS

Catawba College moved up 11 positions to the number 4 slot among Best Regional Colleges in the South in the *2017 U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges* rankings. A perennial climber on this prestigious list, Catawba's recent jump from 15th in 2016 to 4th in 2017 among Best Regional Colleges in the South was welcomed news on campus.

"We are delighted that numerous national publications, including *Princeton Review*, *Forbes*, and *U.S. News* are recognizing that Catawba College is one of the best institutions of its kind. They are reflecting and reporting what we know: that Catawba does an outstanding job of preparing people to reach their highest potential," said Catawba College President Brien Lewis.

Catawba was one of 334 colleges in *U.S. News Regional Colleges* category, ranked according to geographic region: North, South, Midwest, and West. Schools in this category focus almost entirely on the undergraduate experience and offer a broad range of programs in the liberal arts (which account for fewer than half of the bachelor's degrees granted) and in fields such as business, nursing and education.

U.S. News rankings are based on several key measures of quality, all of which are weighted. These include graduation and retention rates (22.5%); assessment of excellence (22.5%); faculty resources (20%); student selectivity (12.5%); financial resources (10%); graduation rate performance – the difference between actual and predicted graduate rates (7.5%); and alumni giving (5%). Scores for each measure are weighted to arrive at a final overall score. In the case of the national universities and national liberal arts colleges, the assessment figure represents input from both academic peers (15 percent) and high school guidance counselors (7.5 percent); for regional universities and colleges, it reflects peer opinion only.

U.S. News Best Colleges rankings are billed as tool "for families concerned with finding the best academic value for their money." The "Best Colleges 2017" rankings mark the 32nd year of this publication that was released online September 13, 2016 at www.usnews.com/colleges.

In Tune Monthly cites Catawba as One of Nation's Best Music Schools for 2017

The accolade came in the publication's October 2016 edition which includes a special report concerning the Best Music Schools for 2017.

Catawba Music Department Chair Dr. David Fish was quoted in the special report entitled, "The Vibe." He recommends that prospective students trying to choose the Best Music School for them actually speak to the students enrolled in a particular school. "I think that they have a fuller sense of the ethos, the lay of the land, of a music program across the board," he says. "The faculty has a partial picture. The students are willing to give unvarnished views of an institution."

Fish also noted the need for developing real world skills as an undergraduate. "There are the hard skills – how you play your instrument, how you sing, the basics of songwriting, engineering, production, the industry – but these are only half of the equation," Fish shared in the special report. "The soft skills like networking, teamwork, tenacity, and perseverance need to be there, too. But they can only be developed after the hard skills – after the students have hit a certain level of age and maturity."

Concerning the size and reputation of a college like Catawba, Fish was quoted as saying: "We're a school that doesn't have that much of a spotlight on us, and I'm happy about that. I think that too much attention can wind up being the proverbial tail wagging the dog – you do things as much for the media value as the education value."

Ranked 9th in the nation for "Best College Theater" according to the Princeton Review's 2017 edition of "The Best 381 Colleges." Catawba is also cited as one of the nation's best institutions for undergraduate education.

Catawba Rankings: Best College Theater #9

The College guide, "The Best 381 Colleges," hit newsstands on August 30th. Published annually since 1992, it includes profiles on only about 15% of America's 2,500 four-year colleges. Catawba's appearance on the "Best College Theater" rankings list is based on the guidebook's surveys of students attending the colleges.

Catawba's profile in the publication includes a Green Rating of 92 out of possible scores ranging from 60-99, and an 86 Quality of Life Rating for campus life.

Catawba students who were surveyed reported that "professors go out of their way to make sure every student is involved in the learning process." They cited "a strong community of teachers, faculty and students with a common goal of excellence in education."

For 4 Straight Years, 1 of Only 4 N.C. Institutions in Top 100 of Forbes 2016 Grateful Grads Index

For four straight years, *Forbes* reports that a Catawba education is well worth its cost. And *Forbes* claims the proof can be seen in the grateful grads who show their gratitude in their alumni giving.

In addition to Catawba which is ranked 73, the other four N.C. institutions ranking in the top 100 of the 2016 Index include Davidson College (7), Duke University (9), and Wake Forest University (41). The 2016 Index ranks the best long-term value, or return-on-investment (ROI) of the top 200 private, not-for-profit colleges enrolling more than 1,000 students.

"We are proud to be recognized alongside such outstanding institutions and we know this ranking reflects what we constantly hear from our alumni: that Catawba made a difference in their lives for which they are very grateful," said Catawba President Brien Lewis.

To determine which colleges provide the best return on investment, *Forbes* shares that it analyzes "two important variables: private donations and gifts per student over 10 years, as reported to the Department of Education and the alumni participation rate, or what percentage of its graduates give back in the form of donations to their colleges."

The first measure *Forbes* calls "our show-me-the-money measure," weighted at 75%. The second metric, the Alumni Participation Rate is measured by the Council for Aid to Education and is weighted at 25%. For the purposes of *Forbes* ranking, the alumni participation rate over the 3 most recent years is averaged.

"I go to class knowing they want me to succeed," one student said. "The professors at Catawba are fantastic. They truly care for your success, not just in the classroom, but in life," shared another.

Catawba students also noted that "the vibe at Catawba is extremely relaxed," the guidebook explained, and that "athletes are extremely well represented among the student population." Overall, the student survey says: "Students are happy. Everyone loves the Catawba Indians. Theater is popular."

The most popular majors at Catawba were reported as Business Administration and Management, Sport and Fitness Administration/Management, and Drama and Dramatics/Theatre Arts.



Ranked among “America’s Top Colleges” by *Forbes* for 6 Years Running

Catawba again makes *Forbes* “America’s Top Colleges” listing, ranked among the 660 best undergraduate institutions in the nation. This is the sixth consecutive year that Catawba has been included in this listing and the ninth year that *Forbes* has released its “America’s Top Colleges.”

Forbes released its “America’s Top Colleges” rankings on July 6th, touting it as a rankings list that sets its sights “directly on ROI: What students are getting out of college?” Catawba came in at 602 in the 2016 rankings.

Forbes created its Top Colleges rankings by partnering with the Center for College Affordability and Productivity, a Washington, D.C. think tank. The *Forbes* math “comes directly from the Department of Education, Payscale, and the America’s Leaders list.” The factors used to calculate the rankings fall into five general categories: post graduate success (32.5%), which evaluates alumni pay and prominence; student debt (25%); student satisfaction (25%); four-year graduation rate (7.5%); and academic success (10%).

Ranks 84th among 256 colleges and universities in the Southeast that deliver the “Best Bang for the Buck,” according to the 2016 *Washington Monthly* College Guide

This publication’s methodology claims to determine which of the nation’s colleges are “doing the best job of helping non-wealthy students attain marketable degrees at affordable prices.”

Contrasting itself to the U.S. News college rankings, *Washington Monthly’s* guide “measures schools based on what they are doing for the country – by improving social mobility, producing research, and promoting public service.”

Washington Monthly contends that the release of a new data set last fall by the Obama administration, the “College Scorecard,” shows how much students earn 10 years after enrolling at a given college and whether they’re paying down at least some of the loan principal they incurred to pay for their college education. The “College Scorecard” also indicates the percent of first-generation students each college enrolls as “a key measure of its commitment to opportunity.”

Washington Monthly’s “2016 Best Bang for the Buck” rankings are broken down according to five geographic regions, Northeast, Midwest, Southeast, South and West.

Locker Rooms Renovated at Catawba's Abernethy P.E. Center

After renovations to the Goodman Gymnasium were completed during summer 2015, work began on the lower level of the facility to renovate the locker rooms for men's and women's basketball and volleyball.

The project finished up just as the teams were reporting this fall. The renovations included a redesign of the section that is home to the volleyball and women's basketball teams. The existing restroom was reconfigured for use by the public, while the teams got new restroom and shower facilities.

The men's basketball locker room and the section that was used by men's swimming was also redesigned to include two separate locker room facilities with new separate shower and bathroom facilities. All locker rooms have new carpeting along with new lighting. A total of 72 new lockers were installed, 18 for each locker room.

The new lockers are from All Wood Locker Company in Ohio. These two foot wide by seven feet tall lockers with a dark oak finish feature a custom-design Catawba "C and feather" athletics logo engraved in the lock box of each locker. The All Wood Locker Company has completed custom locker projects for other institutions such as Wake Forest, UNC Pembroke and Francis Marion.

Alumni and friends of the college have the opportunity to leave a lasting legacy and be a part of a great tradition by sponsoring a locker in the renovated Abernethy Physical Education Center. The cost of a named locker sponsorship is \$1,500, and all gifts may be paid over a three-year pledge period.

A new partnership between Lee Street Theatre and Catawba College will provide a continuum of great theatre and music for the Salisbury community and more real world, hands-on opportunities for Catawba students.

This joint initiative was finalized by Lee Street Board members and Catawba faculty and administrators as longtime Lee Street Managing Artistic Director and Catawba alumnus Justin Dionne '07 prepared to exit his role at the end of June to attend graduate school.

As a component of the partnership, Craig Kolkebeck, who has served as Catawba's scenic shop manager, assumed the position of both interim artistic director for Lee Street and assistant professor of theatre arts at Catawba. In doing so, he will continue to serve as scene shop manager and teach two classes in each semester. In addition, he will work with Lee Street to direct shows, oversee the artistic output of guest directors, assist in developing the 2017/18 season of productions and promote those productions, and facilitate and promote the use of Catawba students in a variety of areas at Lee Street. This will afford Catawba students yet another venue to assume roles as performers, in set & lighting design, set construction, and administrative operations, enhancing their learning environment and opportunities. Kolkebeck will also develop a relationship with Catawba's Department of Music for opportunities for the ADP and Vernaculars to perform at Lee Street, in addition to scheduling other external music concerts.

"Craig has every quality and skillset that we were seeking when we sat down to chart Lee Street's course for the future. And, tapping the skills, talents and resources of Catawba students just makes perfect sense," said Shari Graham.

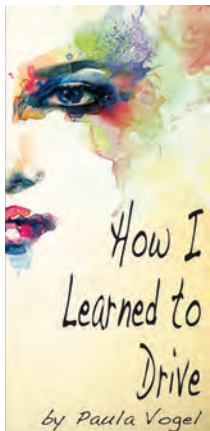

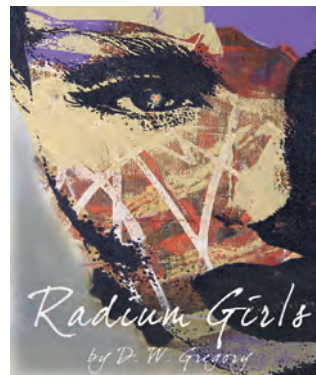

Charlotte. He joined the Catawba College Theatre Arts Department in June of 2013, bringing with him more than 30 years of experience as a SAG/A FTRA/AEA member professional actor and a professional director. He was the former artistic director for Teatro Los Pobres and Southwest Repertory Organization. His productions have ranged from the smallest of warehouse stages to one million dollar venues in the theme park live action stunt show arena here in the U.S., as well as Holland, Germany, Japan and Russia. At Catawba, he discovered a love for teaching and has taught Beginning Acting for non-majors and Acting for the Camera, in addition to his role as scene shop manager.

The Lee Street Board lauded Dionne, who had worked at Lee Street since its early inception, for helping grow its support in the community.

"He was willing to take risks, wear tons of different hats – he did it all and did it very well," Graham said. "While we will miss him, he knows and we know that Lee Street is in capable hands with Craig."

Catawba Provost Dr. Michael Bitzer shared his pleasure at the new partnership with theatre arts faculty on campus. He said, "This partnership will help further the Theatre Arts Department's mission which is 'to cultivate the growth of well-rounded artist/scholars who are accomplished leaders and theatre-makers, who value creativity as a way of understanding and connecting with the world.' "

Segue 61 is a first-of-its-kind, eight-month certificate program offered by Catawba College to 18 elite students, bridging their transition from formal education to full-fledged careers in the music industry.

Segue 61 is a unique program in Nashville, Tennessee that will soon offer promising musicians, songwriters, producers/engineers and music business hopefuls from all genres an advantage in launching their careers. An elite inaugural class of 18 students will be selected from the online applicants to hone their music industry chops under the daily direction of influential mentors. Segue 61's eight-month experience begins January 7, and applicants will be notified by the end of November if they've been accepted into the exclusive program.

Students will benefit from real-world, hands-on training from a broad collection of mentors currently active in the industry. These instructors range from Grammy-winning songwriters and producers to first-call musicians and career-crafting music business executives, as well as members of both the Songwriters and Rock & Roll Halls of Fame.

Respected staff experts include:

- World-renowned session guitarist Guthrie Trapp, whose credits include support for Garth Brooks, Alison Krauss, Jerry Douglas and Sam Bush, among others.
- Versatile drummer Pete Abbott, whose scope of work reaches from Average White Band to session work with legendary producer Phil Ramone to current touring with rising country star Ashley Monroe.
- Former BMI and Sony executive Clay Bradley, whose resume includes support for an extensive list of artists including Miranda Lambert, Kenny Chesney, and George Strait. Bradley is now co-partner of Third Generation management agency, which represents the emerging Muddy Magnolias. He is also the grandson of Owen Bradley who is credited (with Chet Atkins) for founding "The Nashville Sound" in the mid-1950s, which propelled country music into the American mainstream with the groundbreaking Patsy Cline and other artists.

“Segue 61’s purpose is grounded in same vision from which my grandfather’s greatest musical successes were born,” says Bradley, who heads Segue 61’s music business interests. “Owen Bradley and Chet Atkins had a clear, but very different idea of how to deliver what was then country music to a broader consumer base. They had a new way of looking at a traditional model. They followed their vision and changed American music forever.”

“Segue 61 aspires to also offer elite students a very different path to the goals they have in the music profession, through a process whose time has come,” Bradley says. “Let those with real-world, real-time experience in the music business deliver the inside information that isn’t accessible any other way. Music professionals finally have a platform to help develop more informed young candidates for what can be a very tough business.”

After a year of incubation with other platforms, Catawba College’s Music Department Chairman Dr. David Fish began consulting in September, 2014 with Bill Armour, an experienced marketing professional and Special Assistant to Catawba President Brien Lewis, about a more focused plan, targeting the emerging world music market in Nashville. Armour spent over 200 days in Music City engaging with a range of well-placed industry professionals (musicians, engineers/producers, and music business figures) as the Segue 61 model came together.

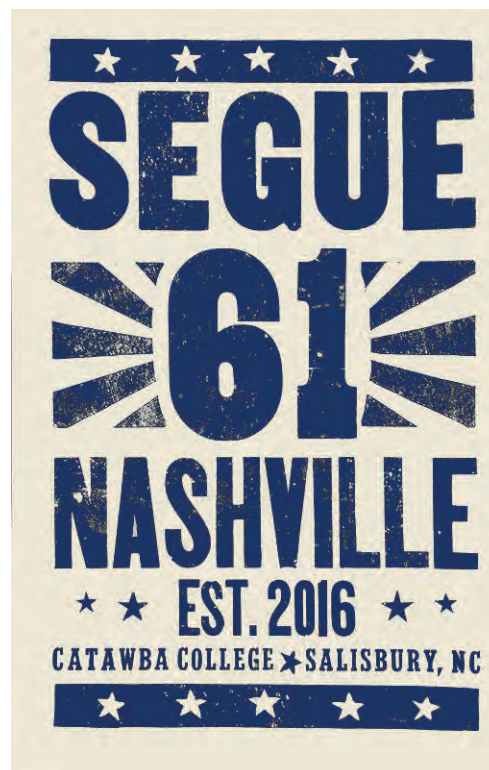
The data in defense of Nashville as the home for Segue 61 was definitive: the city’s density of music industry activity is currently 20 to 30 times as great as that in New York and Los Angeles. Additionally, the core employment in Nashville’s music industry [per 1,000 population/1,000 total employment] (4.19) and earning quotient (4.30) exceeds all other U.S cities including Los Angeles [1.61] and New York [1.13] by 2.5 to 4 times.

Two years of focus group interviews with a myriad of Nashville influencers—as well as with young graduates struggling to establish themselves in the field—produced a consensus calling for a new form of practical career preparation:

- Most of those trying to enter the music industry lack the essential soft skills of communication, teamwork, problem solving, professionalism and tenacity.
- Gaining “street smarts” can take a heavy toll as individuals make costly mistakes that could’ve been avoided through proper mentoring.
- Gaps in job preparation are often found among university graduates who’ve studied popular music, engineering/production, and music business.

Segue 61 is distinct from, but complementary to, other higher education programs when it comes to addressing this instructional void. “Unlike the old A&R model where labels provided a team of experts to nurture an artist’s talent, today’s performers are expected to be more self-sufficient in all aspects of their career,” explains Dr. Fish. “That’s where Segue 61 fits in — as a bridge to provide future music professionals the finishing touches they need to thrive in the modern scene, while offering music execs a trusted pool of polished talent ready to hit the ground running.”

Segue 61 is a unique certificate program offered by Catawba College in Nashville, Tennessee designed to prepare elite students for careers in the music business. With a roster of top music industry professionals mentoring select, strategically chosen classes of exceptional students, Segue 61 aims to provide graduates with the real-world working experience industry employers are actively seeking.

Donor Says New Scholarship She Established at Catawba is Already Paying Dividends



Local philanthropist and arts supporter Sarah Kellogg says her gift to fund an endowed scholarship at Catawba College to honor her longtime friend and music professor Dr. Phillip Burgess is already paying dividends.

The inaugural recipient of the Dr. Phillip E. Burgess Sacred Music Endowed Scholarship is rising Catawba senior R.J. Thornton. Thornton and some of his fellow students in the ensemble Catawba Worship recently distinguished themselves by performing at the National Youth Event (NYE) held at Disney World in Orlando, Fla. Thornton is the student director of Catawba Worship which was invited to perform as the house band at multiple events during the NYE.

“I couldn’t be prouder,” Kellogg shared, after sitting in on a campus rehearsal that Catawba Worship held prior to departing for Orlando. “These students are wonderful, and R.J. most certainly is deserving as the recipient of the scholarship named in Phillip’s honor.”

Kellogg met Burgess 20 years ago through St. Luke’s Episcopal Church where she sang in the choir and he played the organ and served as musical director. Preference for the scholarship Kellogg established in Burgess’ honor will be given to students majoring in Music and pursuing concentrations in Sacred Music. Thornton met those criteria; he is a Music Education major who has helped direct Catawba’s annual Lessons & Carols, as well as fall and spring choral concerts. Thornton spent last summer in New Jersey at the Westminster Choral College studying with Burgess’ former teachers to hone and improve his own musical skills.

“I was very honored by Sarah’s generosity,” Burgess said. “Most scholarships are given in memory of a loved one, but this scholarship is given in honor of someone still living. It is exciting that I can see first-hand how this scholarship will be distributed, and I can see the student recipient’s development as a result of the scholarship.”

Catawba is one of only a few colleges in North Carolina to offer a Sacred Music program. Its Sacred Music concentration is designed to prepare students for careers as a church musician who can function successfully as a performer, administrator, and as a choral and instrumental director. The program also acquaints students with methods and materials needed to implement a church music program. The primary performance medium for students pursuing this concentration at Catawba is the organ.

Kellogg’s gift to establish the scholarship in honor of Burgess belies her own interest and passion in music and the arts. She earned her Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from Converse College in Spartanburg, S.C. She has contributed her time, talents and resources to other organizations in Salisbury, including Waterworks Visual Arts Center, Historic Salisbury Foundation and St. Luke’s Episcopal Church.

“It is a privilege to be able to be generous, and it is especially good if students can benefit. Phillip is so worthy of this honor, not only because he is a friend, but because he is a very talented man who so willingly nurtures the talents of others. When he joined Catawba, he was very excited about teaching and about what his students were accomplishing.”

Kellogg confided she has also made recent gifts to Catawba that will help underwrite the musical costs of the annual Lessons & Carols service, that will mark its 29th year this holiday season, as well as gifts to cover costs of other choral concerts that Burgess and his students will offer.

CATAWBA WORSHIP PERFORMS AT NATIONAL YOUTH EVENT AT WALT DISNEY WORLD

Three to four thousand youth from around the globe got to know a little more about Catawba College after they attend the National Youth Event (NYE), co-hosted by the United Church of Christ and The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) at Walt Disney World in Florida, July 26-30.

Catawba Worship, an ensemble of 17 student singers and instrumentalists from Catawba College, performed as the main house band at all worship sessions and after-hours events during the NYE. Catawba Worship, under the leadership of Drs. Phillip Burgess and Julie Chamberlain in Catawba's Department of Music and student director R.J. Thornton, a senior from Durham, also presented multiple workshops to youth ages 13-18, church leaders and volunteers who attended the event. Cindy Barr, Catawba's Vice President of Enrollment, accompanied the group and presented a workshop session.

Catawba Worship represents the diverse student population of Catawba College. The ensemble's music is inclusive of current and traditional worship, both of which are relevant in today's worship. The arrangements of the music performed, both secular and sacred, reflect the Catawba students' creativity and leadership.

Chamberlain, an associate professor and director of sacred music and worship arts, said Catawba was honored to receive the invitation that required herculean preparation efforts by all involved. CATAWBA COLLEGE PLANTS A "CEED"

New Program to Encourage and Develop Entrepreneurship

A new Entrepreneurship program and Center for Entrepreneurship and Experiential Development or CEED is now a part of the Ralph W. Ketner School of Business at Catawba College. An open house at the new CEED headquarters on campus, located in the former Whitener Room of the Cannon Student Center, was held in April.

CEED Director Dr. Renee Just says the program will have many elements. At its foundation are its educational components, driven first and foremost by the introduction of both a Concentration within the Bachelor of Science Business Administration program, along with a Minor available to all Catawba students. Four core courses and five elective courses on Entrepreneurship will make up the initial curriculum that has been offered beginning in the 2016–2017 academic year.

In addition to these new degree options, CEED will also hold Entrepreneurship Workshops that will be open to the entire Catawba community and feature topics from Business Planning to Funding to Making the Pitch.

Just believes this educational component will serve as the bedrock of CEED. "The educational elements of CEED touch everyone, whether they will ultimately launch a successful new business or not. The skills associated with entrepreneurship are extremely important for students entering today's business environment."

In addition to the educational aspects, CEED will be building out both a business incubator (CEED Venture Program) and a business accelerator (CEED Catapult). Students, faculty, and other members of the Catawba community who have business ideas will be able to apply for acceptance into these programs and get important help in developing and launching them.

CEED is also developing a strong Mentor Network, made up of successful entrepreneurs and business people from the local community and the alumni community. Mentors will be matched with startups and provide guidance to the entrepreneurs.

Dr. Steve Coggin returns to the classroom as a professor of biology on a full-time basis from his prior three-year role as associate provost. He will also serve as the director of the Ketner Center for International Studies.

Dr. Constance Rogers-Lowery, a professor of biology, now serves as acting associate provost for faculty development through the fall semester and teaching part time. She will be evaluated in her new role at the end of the 2016 fall semester. She oversees Institutional Research and Effectiveness, General Education Assessment, the Honors Program, the First Year Experience, International Studies, Faculty Orientation, Faculty Professional Development, Coordination of Department Class Schedules, to include Winter Term and Summer School, and creation of the annual College Catalog.

Dr. Forrest Anderson, an associate professor of English, now serves as associate provost for student academic success. He oversees Student Academic Success Initiatives, supervising a professional staff coordinator and including the areas of Tutoring Services, Supplemental Instruction, Testing Services, and Disability Services, as well as Career Development, including Catawba to Career (C2C) and Career Services, Academic Conduct and Student Orientation.

Dr. Eric Hake, a professor of economics in the Ketner School of Business, now serves as associate dean of academic affairs for KSOB. In this role, Dr. Hake will serve as administrator for the department of business and economics, as well as coordination of recruiting of new students and scholarship opportunities in conjunction with admissions, the KSOB faculty, and the dean; coordination of information and materials for marketing the Ketner School; and, providing strategic leadership for new program development in the future for the school.

Dr. Jamie Slate, an associate professor of economics, is the associate dean for external affairs and marketing for the Ketner School of Business. In this role, he will develop and implement programs and initiatives to grow the enrollment and engagement with external constituencies, including community programming, service as KSOB Ambassador, explore and implement initiatives such as the Small Business Start-Up Information Center at Downtown Catawba, and other activities and duties related to service as the chief marketing officer for the KSOB.

Dr. Jay Bolin, assistant professor of biology, has been appointed as chair of the department of biology.

Dr. Charles McAllister

Upon his retirement, Catawba recognized Dr. Charles McAllister, a professor of history who joined the college in 1986 bringing with him his passion for British History.

Dr. McAllister earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in History from King College, a Master of Arts degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, and his Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Virginia. He also completed postgraduate study at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, and at Oxford University.

Prior to joining the Catawba faculty, Dr. McAllister held posts at Piedmont Virginia Community College, Averett College, the University of Virginia, and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

This native of Galax, Virginia, once shared: "I want to convey to the students my appreciation of history, the excitement and thrill of learning." Dr. McAllister did that with each of the 49 different courses he taught in a dozen areas in the liberal arts, including Art, History, Honors, Math, Music, Non-Western Perspective, Philosophy, Political Science, Religion, Sociology, and Theatre Arts.

This former chair of the History Department and former recipient of Catawba's Teacher of the Year Award says that his most memorable achievement as a faculty member has been "watching many students grow into responsible, interesting, and interested adults after graduation – and humbled that many still want me to be part of their lives."

Students throughout his tenure have not changed, Dr. McAllister contends, but says rather "They still come to us as intelligent, but inexperienced individuals unsure about themselves and their places in the world. It's our task to help them mature with the best learning experiences that we can provide inside the classroom and out."

As he retires, Dr. McAllister shares this parting advice to students and to faculty who come after him: "Never be satisfied with the first answer you get to any question."

CATAWBA BIDS FAREWELL TO THREE FACULTY MEMBERS

These three Catawba faculty members, with a combined 84 years of service to the institution, were recognized during the 2016 Commencement Exercises held May 14, all of whom were approved for faculty emeritus status by the College Board of Trustees at a June meeting.



Dr. Lyn Boulter

Psychology professor Dr. Lyn Boulter retired after three decades of service. She joined the college in 1986, and says she spent her tenure at Catawba being open to new experiences. In fact, she shares, that if anyone came to her with a new idea, "I'd always say, 'Yes'. For me," she continues, "it was an opportunity for a new experience."

Dr. Boulter's willingness to say yes to those new ideas and experiences led to the development of a Special Education major at Catawba, the development of several articulation agreements between area community colleges and Catawba, and the development of the Birth to Kindergarten program within Catawba's School of Evening and Graduate Studies. In fact, that B-K program actually draws the majority of its students from the area community colleges thanks to the articulation agreements Dr. Boulter helped create.

She earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology-Social Work from the University of Pennsylvania at California, her Master of Science degree in Child Development – Family Relations from West Virginia University in Morgantown, and her Ph.D. in Life Span Development Psychology from West Virginia University.

Before joining the faculty at Catawba, Dr. Boulter was a lecturer in the Department of Psychology and Human Development at California Polytechnic State University in San Luis Obispo, California. While earning her various academic degrees, she also spent time working as a caseworker in the special education program in the Pennsylvania Public Schools and for the Pennsylvania Association for Retarded Children.

This former chair of Catawba's Faculty Senate has been honored by the College with the President's Award for Community Service in 2014, the Swink Prize for Outstanding Classroom Teaching in 2003, and the Paul Fisher Service Award in 2001. In the Salisbury community, Professor Boulter has been honored by The ARC of Rowan County with its Volunteer of the Year Award in 2007 and by the Partners in Learning Child Development Center Board of Directors as the recipient of the Shirley Ritchie Service Award in 2004.

She shares these parting words with her students: "Stay away from the darkness, the negativeness of life. Be optimistic, be positive, and open to new experiences." Quoting Helen Keller she adds, "Keep your face to the sun and you will never see the shadows."



Dr. Kurt Corriher

Dr. Kurt Corriher, a professor of German and the director of the Ketner Center for International Studies, was recognized for his 24 years of service to Catawba. This native of Rowan County and a former Fulbright Fellow to Vienna, Austria joined the faculty in 1992 teaching German.

Dr. Corriher earned his bachelor's degree with Honors in German from Davidson College, where he was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, and his M.F.A. in Acting and his Ph.D. in German Literature from UNC Chapel Hill.

When the Catawba reduced the foreign language requirement for students in the late 1990s, Dr. Corriher became a half-time professor of German and a half-time director of Catawba's fledgling Information Technology Department. He later moved into a role of teaching while also directing Catawba's former Hobbie Center for Value and Ethics, now the Lilly Center for Vocation and Values.

In 2003, Dr. Corriher was appointed director of Catawba's Center for International Studies, while still teaching his beloved German. He put his M.F.A. in Theatre to good use in the late 2000s as he became a Professor of Theatre Arts, while still directing the college's efforts in study abroad opportunities for its students.

He nurtured his acting, directing and fiction writing throughout his tenure at Catawba. To his credit, he has published two novels, directed three shows at the college, and acted in and directed numerous community theatre productions. He also collaborated with colleagues to nurture things of the spirit and the mind by working with the late Dr. Dan Brown in Salisbury's Center for Faith in the Arts that Brown founded. In fact, Dr. Corriher founded the Center for Faith in the Arts' drama company, Saint Thomas Players.

In his reassignments and shifts of duties at the College, Dr. Corriher picked up responsibility for booking speakers for Catawba's Community Forums. He brought notable names like Leonard Pitts, a Pulitzer Prize winning newspaper columnist, and Dr. Jim Martin, a former N.C. Governor who had been one of his professors at Davidson, to campus.

Departing, he cites a quote from Goethe: "The more one learns, the less one knows," and shares these words with his former students: "I'm glad I got to know you and I wish you all the best in the world. I hope I made a small difference in your life."

Catawba's Vice President for Business and Finance, assumed additional responsibilities with the start of the new academic year.

NELSON MURPHY



Nelson Murphy now serves as the institution's Chief Operating Officer, responsible for more broadly coordinating and executing operational activities related to information technology, enrollment management, development, and communications.

Catawba President Brien Lewis made the announcement about Murphy's expanded responsibilities at an August 8 fall conference gathering of faculty and staff on campus.

As Vice President for Business and Finance, Murphy already oversees the College's budget, business office, facilities, human resources, and public safety functions.

Current members of Lewis' cabinet who are responsible for those aforementioned areas will continue to report directly to the President. This new "dotted line" reporting relationship to the COO will allow the President to focus more on strategic priorities for these areas as well as major fundraising activities. This operational focus will also expedite decision-making and improve efficiency as the President is away from campus more frequently for fundraising and resource development activities.

Catawba appointed Murphy as Vice President of Business and Finance in January of 2015 to succeed retiring Chief Financial Officer Chuck Williams. Lewis said in announcing Murphy's hiring that "Nelson has enjoyed a robust and varied career as a financial leader supporting a variety of domestic and international businesses."

Murphy, who has comprehensive experience in many areas of senior financial responsibility, had worked most recently as Vice President of International Finance for Syniverse Technologies, Inc. in Contern, Luxembourg. Prior to joining Syniverse, Murphy worked in senior financial roles for Northrop Grumman Corporation, Reader's Digest Europe, and Telegis Networks, Inc., a venture capital backed business in Los Gatos, Calif. He began his career with AT&T where he worked for nearly 20 years largely supporting their Consumer Communication Services and Network Systems businesses throughout the world.

He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting from Wake Forest University, and completed the Darden Executive Education program through the University of Virginia. Married to wife Carol, the couple are parents of two adult sons, Connor and Charlie.

Director hired for "DISCOVER,"
Theology Institute at Catawba

The new director of the Theology Institute, "DISCOVER," and Volunteer Catawba is a recent Catawba College alumnus. Christopher Gratton '15 of Burlington, Vt., began his position at the College on March 1 and successfully oversaw two DISCOVER programs this summer – one for high school youth and one for junior high youth.

Gratton was responsible for putting together the faculty for the Theology Institute, hiring, training and supervising interns from the participating colleges that staffed the Institute, and recruiting and screening participants. One quarter of his position will be devoted to Volunteer Catawba, an on-campus clearinghouse that connects students and members of the college community with local non-profit opportunities in need of volunteers.

"DISCOVER," funded by a \$600,000 grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., is a program to educate middle and senior high school youth about theology and ministry and to help prepare the next generation of leadership for the Church. It involved collaboration from faculty at Catawba, Livingstone College, Hood Theological Seminary, and some local clergy to create a vibrant and challenging curriculum for the youth who opt to pursue the study of God and of faith. "DISCOVER" is a part of the Lilly Endowment Inc.'s High School Youth Theology Institutes Initiative, which seeks to encourage young people to explore theological traditions, ask questions about the moral dimensions of contemporary issues, and examine how their faith calls them to lives of service.

DISCOVER participants in both the junior and high school programs will reunite with each other during a December gathering to be scheduled on Catawba's campus. And Gratton says plans are already underway for offering several sessions of the DISCOVER program again during summer 2017.

The DISCOVER experience is free and applications for summer 2017 programs will be accepted from youth of all religious denominations and affiliations as well as from youth who are not part of a congregation. Catawba College introduces new Registrar

Catawba College had a new Registrar in place as the '15-'16 spring semester began. College Provost Dr. J. Michael Bitzer announced that Susan Agner, a longtime College employee, had been selected following a national search to fill the position created by the December 2015 retirement of Carol Gamble. Gamble had held the position of College Registrar since 1992.

"We are thrilled that Susan's appointment will allow a smooth and seamless transition in the Registrar's Office," Bitzer said in making the announcement. "She brings a deep understanding of college operations and technical expertise that is second to none. She is also a devoted Catawba employee and alumna, something I am sure will be readily apparent to our students and her co-workers on the staff and faculty."

Agner, who joined Catawba in 1985, has most recently served as senior programmer analyst with the College IT Department, where she worked closely with the Registrar's staff during the recent enterprise system (Ellucian Banner) migration and in support of that office's operations. Previously, she served as Catawba's director of administrative computing and programmer analyst, along with serving in the College's Development Office and Career Planning and Placement.

Agner earned her bachelor's degree in computer information systems, magna cum laude, from Catawba in 1997. She has played an active role on the College's Staff Council, serving as past chair. She currently serves on a newly formed Benefits Task Force, appointed by College President Brien Lewis.

Married to husband Terry, a retired law enforcement officer, the couple has three sons, two of whom are Catawba graduates, and a grandson.

Catawba's Title IX Administrator, effective with the start of the new academic year, also will continue with her faculty rank to teach.



Dr. Erin Wood, a tenured Associate Professor of Psychology who formerly served as Deputy Title IX Coordinator for Athletics at Catawba College, has accepted a new role at the College. She is Catawba's Title IX Administrator, effective with the start of the new academic year, while continuing with her faculty rank to teach some classes at the institution.

Dr. Wood replaces Dr. Jim Hand in his previous role as Catawba's Title IX Coordinator, a role he held for the past three years. She will report directly to College President Brien Lewis and will assist the College with on- and off-campus relationships aimed to support equity at all areas of Title IX, including employee and student quality of life, Admissions and Enrollment, Facilities and Housing, Athletics, prevention and education collaborations with Student Affairs, Human Resources, and Institutional Research, diversity on campus, pregnant and parenting students, and intimate partner violence/Sexual Assault Task Force.

In her formalized role, Dr. Wood said she looks forward to working with programs that are already successfully underway, as well as participating in bringing more opportunities for education and learning to the campus community.

President Lewis noted Catawba's commitment to providing equal opportunities for all students, employees, applicants for student admission and applicants for employment regardless of sex or sexual orientation unless allowed by law and deemed necessary to the operation of the College. In sharing news of Dr. Wood's appointment, he said he was pleased "to announce a revised position in the area of Catawba's commitment to sex and gender equity."

A native of Madison, Va., Dr. Wood majored in psychology and minored in biology on her way to earning a Bachelor of Science degree at Virginia Commonwealth University. There, she also earned a Master of Science degree researching behavioral pharmacology and a Ph.D. focusing on behavioral genetics. Upon graduating, she accepted a faculty position in Catawba's Psychology Department.

Dr. Wood has taught and will continue to teach a variety of courses, including General Psychology, Data Analysis for the Behavioral Sciences, Health Psychology, Behavior Modification, Neuroscience, Cognitive Processes, as well as First Year Seminars including topics on lying and sex and gender. She also has co-taught a course in Catawba's Honors program that focused on death and dying, and is in preparation to co-teach another Honors course in the spring semester on neurodiversity.

She currently serves as the advisor to the Diversity Club, as well as to the College's Psi Chi chapter. She has continued her training in the realm of Title IX, earning certification as a Title IX Coordinator and Civil Right Investigator at in-person workshops, as well as participating in numerous webinars to stay up-to-date in the ever-changing world of federal compliance.

Over the next several months, Dr. Wood will be meeting with various people on campus, as well as in the community at large, to learn of Catawba's unique needs and desires in terms of gender equity and diversity. a self-described friend-raiser of fund-raising at Catawba, transitioned out of her role as Director of Alumni and Parent Relations last winter to assume responsibilities as Assistant Vice President, Donor Relations at the College.

Although she admits she is excited for the opportunity “to help steer the course of the Development Office,” she looked back on her 20 years in her former role through a lens filtered by dear and fond memories, laughter and a few tears.

“For me, it has been all about the relationships. I love that I have gotten the chance to really know so many of our alumni from all generations,” she explains.

Love of place is something Faust knows succinctly well. She credits her parents, in particular dad Dr. Robert Wilson '62, a true blue Catawba alumnus, for putting her on the Catawba love train early in her life. She shares with pride that her father has only missed one Homecoming in his life – when he was serving in Vietnam, and adds that her mother Peggy attended to represent him that year.

When it came time for Faust to head off to college, there really was only one college on her mind – Catawba. It was the only college to which she applied. Remembering that time in her life and flashing her characteristic smile, she jokes, “I have always thought that Catawba was ‘the stuff.’”

As an undergraduate, Faust was the epitome of a Catawba student. She entered the college as a First Family Scholar and pursued a major in communications. She lived on campus in North Hall (now Stanback Residence Hall) for all four years. She served as SGA president, was a cheerleader, an Alpha, and a Catawba Guide. Even after her graduation, she served as an alumni volunteer for Admissions when she lived in Raleigh.

Her own allegiance to Catawba and its Homecoming tradition rivals her father’s. She has been attending Homecoming since she was two years old. But Faust does laugh when she recalls having to miss a Homecoming after she had planned all the activities as the Alumni Director. In 1998, her physician required

that she be on bed rest due to a difficult pregnancy with twins.

Faust says she was a young passionate alumna when she assumed her role at Catawba in 1995. And while she confides that her passion is still very much intact, another feeling has gained equal weight - a feeling of responsibility for the well-being and future of the College.

“I’m here for the greater good, and I want to see my school thrive,” she contends. “We have to be sure we convey to alumni that Catawba is worth supporting. Simply put, supporting Catawba is re-investing in your diploma!”

Faust says there are legendary Catawba alumni who have enriched her life. These are individuals “who taught loyalty, doing the right thing, and how to make people feel special.” They include Tom Childress '64, the now retired senior vice president of Development who hired Faust. Childress “saw something in me and has been there to help during the time we worked together and beyond,” she explains. “I learned early on that you should study the folks you respect, and I’ve always loved his style.”

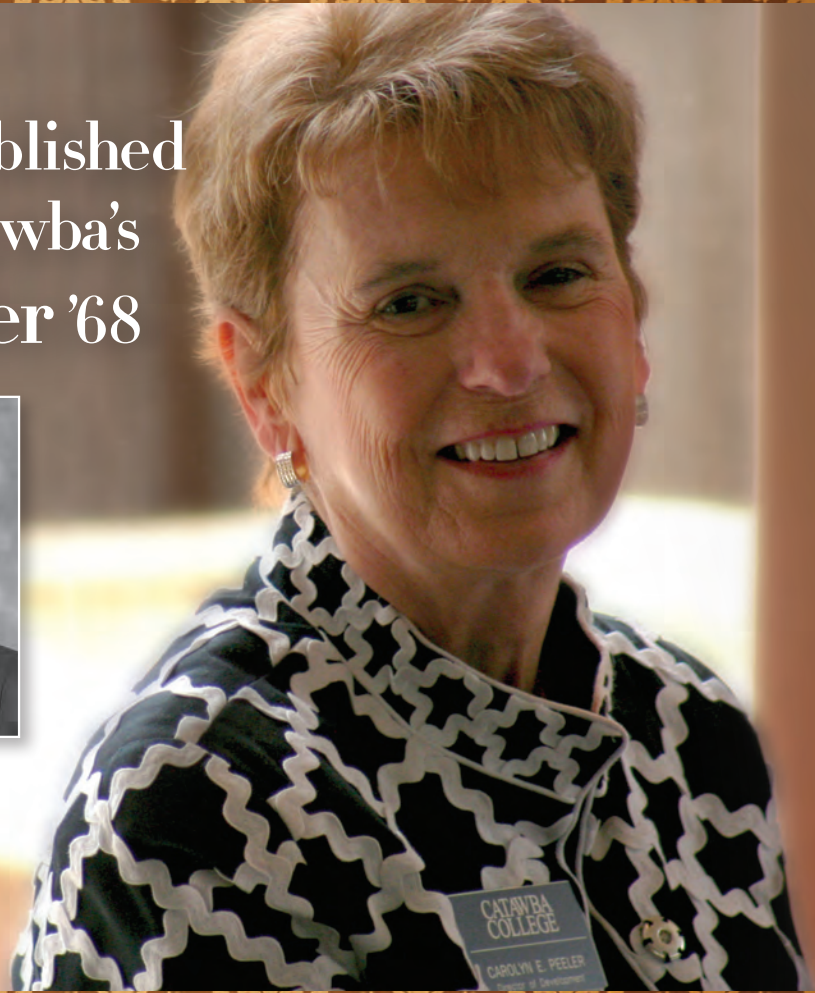

Scholarship Established in Honor of Catawba's Carolyn Peeler '68

CAROLYN EICHLER PEELER '68 is officially pondering her retirement from the Catawba College Development Office, although no firm dates has been set for leaving her employer of the past 40 years. But in early summer, she received an enduring surprise that will most certainly help her mark her tenure at the college that is also her alma mater.

During a Development Office staff meeting that included 1961 Catawba alumnus Dr. W. Guy Rich on the phone, Peeler learned that Rich had established and fully funded an endowed scholarship fund in her honor. The announcement caused the longtime Development Director to fight back tears as she heard the news.

Ironically, it was Peeler, who during her time at Catawba, had helped hundreds of individuals direct their gifts and fund scholarships like the one established in her name. This time, she had known nothing about it, and was the one being honored.

“Carolyn Peeler is one of my favorite people at Catawba,” Rich shared, while Peeler’s coworkers looked on, most as surprised as she was by the announcement. “She is a great person. I ran out of time and Carolyn was retiring and she was getting away from me, and I said, ‘Okay, pull the trigger,’ and I did.”

“I don’t know what to say....” Peeler stammered in response, fighting back tears as she added: “Thank you so much, Guy. I cannot tell you how much this really means to me.”

“You’re very deserving, Carolyn. You are a special person, and I mean that,” Rich said, noting that Peeler would decide criteria governing the selection of recipients who would receive her scholarship.

And when Peeler did set those criteria, it was in her typical,

no-nonsense, just get the job done fashion; the student receiving her scholarship must simply demonstrate financial need.

When Peeler came to work at Catawba in 1976 she joined the staff in Development as a gift recorder. She held positions as director of gift records, associate director of development-administration, and director of development services before accepting a position as assistant registrar in 1990. Just over a year later, Peeler returned to Catawba’s Development Office, promoted to assistant vice president for development and campaign manager.

For many alumni and friends of Catawba, Peeler has been a constant and revered fixture at the College, one who always remembered their names, their important details, and who made them feel welcomed when they visited. She was one who carried the mantle for her alma mater and seemed to bloom beautifully exactly where she was planted.

“Guy Rich could not have found a more perfect way to honor our friend Carolyn who has helped so many others establish scholarships at Catawba over the years,” remarked Margaret W. Faust '89, assistant vice president of development and a longtime coworker of Peeler’s. She noted that Rich had been instrumental over the years in both establishing and spearheading fund-raising drives to establish endowed scholarship funds at the College.

Peeler makes her home in Granite Quarry with husband Robert (Gordy). The two are parents of adult son, Matthew, also a Catawba alumnus in the Class of 1993, who is married to another Catawba alumna, Renita Smith Peeler '92.

1979 ALUMNUS HONORED WITH CATAWBA'S PRESTIGIOUS ADRIAN SHUFORD AWARD

Catawba alumnus and trustee **Gregory M. Alcorn of Salisbury** was honored by his alma mater in May as the 2016 recipient of the College's prestigious **Adrian L. Shuford, Jr. Award for Distinguished Service.**

Alcorn was presented the award by College President Brien Lewis during a special 1851 Society Celebration for the institution's major donors in Peeler Crystal Lounge of the Robertson College-Community Center.

Lewis called Alcorn "a highly successful businessman and entrepreneur" whose "decisions and interactions are driven by his faith and an abiding love for his God, his family and his community." He said Alcorn is "an agent of change" who "willingly steps forward to accept new challenges."

Named in honor of the late Adrian L. Shuford, Jr. of Conover, a businessman and a long-serving member of the College Board of Trustees, the annual award is presented to individuals whose actions and generosity to both the college and their communities emulate those of Mr. Shuford. Originally the President's Award for Distinguished Service and first presented in 1983, the award was renamed in 1984 to honor Mr. Shuford for his service and generosity to Catawba.

Alcorn has lived in Salisbury since he was eight years old and grew up on the Catawba College campus. He graduated from Salisbury High School and then Catawba before earning his MBA from UNC Charlotte. Today, he is the CEO of Global Contact Services (GCS). GCS, which Alcorn began in 2001, has served retail, insurance, financial and government clients for over 15 years. It provides client with outsourced staffing and management for customer interactions.

Alcorn was tapped to serve on the Catawba College Board of Trustees in 1999 and has served on a variety of its committees, including Finance, Enrollment, Governance, and Audit. He has also served on Catawba's Chiefs Club Board, its Green Revolving Fund committee, and a Presidential Search committee. Catawba honored him with its Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2010 and the Church-College Award in 2015.

He serves on a variety of boards, including the United Church Homes and Services, the North Carolina State Board of Education, Families First, the First UCC Foundation, Waterworks Visual Arts Center and The Appleseed Project. He is active with The First Tee of Salisbury, Boy Scouts and his church, First United Church of Christ in Salisbury. He is a member of the World Presidents' Organization.

Married to wife Missie for 25 years, the two are parents of children Clark and Eleanor, both students at UNC Chapel Hill.

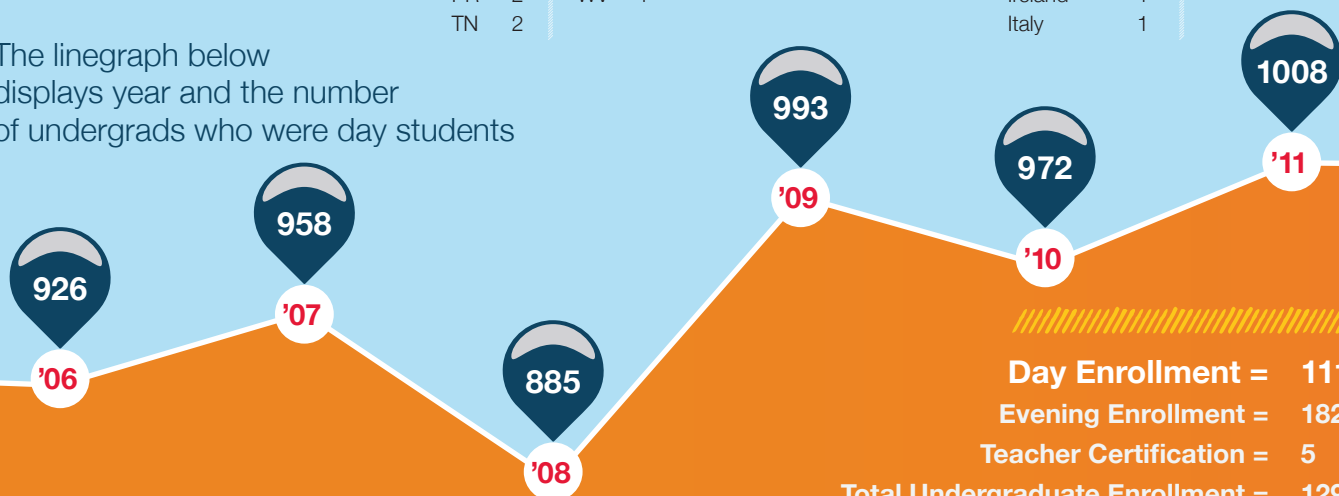

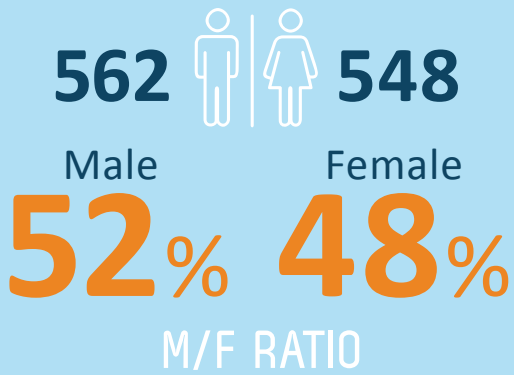

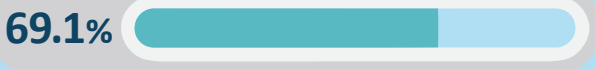

In 2002, we had 1538 undergrads including 511 in the evening BBA, 15 teacher cert, and 19 graduate students. Similarly, in 2003 undergrads totaled 1452 students with 454 evening BBA students, 24 teacher cert, and 19 graduate students. It looks like the other early years show the same proportions.



Dr. Steve Coggin is a curious person,

interested in all things scientific –

everything from birds that fly while asleep 30 miles off the coast to delicate and elusive plants you must tromp to hidden places to find. It is no wonder then that this Catawba College professor of biology decided to pony up \$199 to 23andMe Personal Genome Service for a personalized genetic health report.



With his usual wry sense of humor and in the first-person, he shares the results of his voyage to genome discovery that began over Christmas Break in 2015 and concluded in March of this year.

Waiting to Know – February 24, 2016

I have been waiting since that fateful day in December when I spit into the tube.

When I check in on my 23andme account it says the status is "Validating data". [It] Has been for several weeks.

This week I got an email from 23andme saying they are having technical difficulties and are refunding my shipping fee. So, it is taking much longer than expected.

Reviewing the Results – March 1, 2016

Me. The results are in. And they are interesting.

No surprise that I am not a carrier of 36 horrific genetic diseases. I was not expecting that since there is no history of these diseases in my family. But it is a nice thing [that] I can report to my children that they are also unlikely to be carriers either.

The report suggests I am likely to consume more caffeine than the population at large because of variants in a couple of genes involved in drug metabolism. I don't know about more caffeine but a caffeinated drink at night does not keep me up.

The report says I am unlikely to flush when consuming alcohol because of a gene variant for an enzyme involved in ethanol breakdown. (We need to have some wine and see if it is true.)

My muscle composition has more fast-twitch fibers so, as you can [tell] by looking at me, I am a sprinter.

One of the areas where I disagree with the report is lactose tolerance. I have inherited one normal copy of the gene for lactase and one inactive copy. This should mean I can digest lactose, but I cannot. This trait is more complex than the result of one gene so, strike one for 23andme.

Other traits: cleft chin, predicted no – correct; cheek dimples, predicted no – correct; light colored eyes, predicted – blue; and attached earlobes, predicted no – correct.

Hair color: dark, wavy; 23andme got those right. Male pattern baldness, yes, again. Waxy ear wax, yes. Ring finger longer than index finger, right again.

I don't sneeze going into bright light. That was one I never thought about. But it was predicted by my DNA and true.

Light skin and freckles, yes and yes. These guys are pretty good.

I can taste bitter things and can smell asparagus in urine. Both things that are predicted, correct, and important to me.

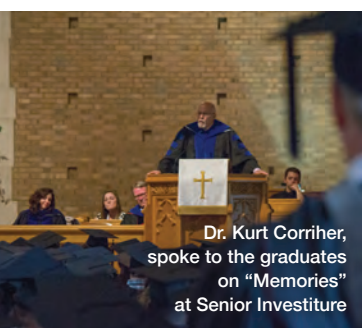
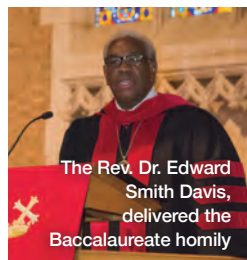
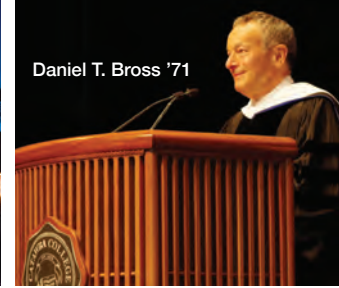
One of the most interesting reports was on ancestry. According to my DNA, I am 99.4% European and within Europe: 39.2% Britain and Ireland, and 21% Scandinavian. The Scandinavian was of great interest because my maternal grandfather came to the U.S. from Sweden. If we just calculated % heritage I would be 25% Swedish, very close to the 21% value in the report.

Maybe even more interesting is I am 4% Neanderthal. That is the 74th percentile of 23andme customers. Call me Caveman. One of my colleagues asked if it was ONLY 4%.

There are lots more data to go through, but it has been fun seeing if I agree with the reported data.

Erin Brockovich

Consumer advocate Erin Brockovich, best known for her involvement in one of the largest direct action lawsuits in U.S. history, will speak November 7 at Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C.

Her topic will be “Community Power: How We Can All Make a Difference in Creating a Healthier Planet.”

While working as a file clerk at a Los Angeles law firm in 1992, Brockovich uncovered documents that ultimately led to more than 600 residents of Hinkley, California, filing a lawsuit against utility giant PG&E. The \$333 million settlement they received is the largest of its kind in the history of the United States.

The story of Brockovich’s life and involvement in the case was the subject of the 2000 film *Erin Brockovich*, which starred Julia Roberts in the title role.

In 2001 she published the book *Take It from Me: Life’s a Struggle But You Can Win*, which became a *New York Times* bestseller, and was the host of a *Lifetime* series called *Final Justice with Erin Brockovich* as well as the *ABC* special *Challenge America with Erin Brockovich*. She has also become an in-demand speaker, frequently traveling the international lecture circuit, and was one of the primary contributors to the 2012 documentary *Last Call at the Oasis*, an investigation into the impact of the depletion of the world’s water supply.

In the time since the Hinkley lawsuit that made her famous, Brockovich has continued to work as a consumer advocate and environmental activist.

She has been involved in numerous successful lawsuits against environmental polluters as well as ongoing lawsuits involving automobiles, pharmaceuticals and medical devices. She is the president of Brockovich Research & Consulting and in partnership with Google curates a crowd-sourced map intended to track possible environmental health hazards around the world.

Catawba College has announced its 2015-16 athletic award winners for its student-athletes. The awards were presented at the annual athletic ceremony held at the Keppel Auditorium on Tuesday, May 3. Heading the list of award winners were **CARLEY TYSINGER** and **DYLAN RICHARDSON**, who were awarded the **LOMAX** and **HIRKLAND AWARDS** for the top male and female senior athletes who have been in attendance for at least three years, and **GRETA TAMASAUSHAITE** and **GARY WILLIAMS**, who were given the **WURSTER AWARDS** for team leadership.

TYSINGER, a softball player from **Lexington, N.C.**, was named the **LOMAX AWARD** winner. She is a three-time South Atlantic Conference Pitcher of the Year and three-time All-American. She has helped the team to consecutive SAC Tournament titles and stands eighth in NCAA II with 1,340 career strikeouts. She has a 101-39 career record with 34 shutouts.

RICHARDSON, of **Randleman, N.C.**, who played baseball, earned the **HIRKLAND AWARD**. He was an all-conference and Gold Glove winner as a senior and was named to the NCAA II National All-Tournament team a year ago as Catawba was runner-up in the nation. He helped the baseball team to an unprecedented four SAC Championships, two SAC Tournament titles and three regional appearances.

The **WURSTER AWARDS** were established to honor a male and a female that demonstrate strong character, able leadership and an outstanding team-before-self attitude. **TAMASAUSHAITE**, a basketball player from **Vilnius, Lithuania**, and **WILLIAMS**, a football player from **Southport, N.C.**, earned this year's awards.

Men's soccer player, **TOBIAS IRIAH**, of **London, England**, was awarded the **DARRUS MORRIS "IRONHORSE" AWARD** for returning to action following a severe injury. Iriah tore his ACL and suffered nerve damage during drills in the fall of 2013. He returned to action this fall, assisting on a goal over 16 games.

HYLE MECHLING, of **Quinton, Va.**, and **LAUREN SLEDD**, of **Roanoke, Va.**, were the recipients of the **SAAC AWARD** for the highest cumulative GPA's for seniors. Mechling, a physical education major that plays tennis, posted a 3.94 grade point average. Sledd, a tennis player, had a 3.90 GPA while majoring in communications. The **WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY TEAM** took the team award with a 3.56 GPA.

NCAA II Softball Academic

Catawba softball pitcher Carley Tysinger graduated as one of the most decorated student-athletes in school history, but her last award might be the most rewarding. Tysinger, who graduated with a 3.75 GPA in chemistry, was honored as the NCAA II Softball Academic All-American of the Year.

She joins Angela Harbour, who earned the honor in women's basketball in 1992-93, as the only Catawba student-athletes to earn the prestigious honor.

The Lexington, N.C., native helped Catawba to consecutive South Atlantic Conference Tournament titles, earning MVP honors in both 2015 and 2016. Those championships mark the only fast pitch titles in school history. The Lady Indians nearly won four SAC Tournaments during Tysinger's four seasons, losing twice on championship day her freshman season and nearly making the 2014 final undefeated had it not been for an Anderson walk-off homerun that erased a 2-0 deficit.

Tysinger rewrote the Catawba pitching record book. She set records for strikeouts in a game, season and career. Her 27 strikeouts in a 16-inning win in the 2014 SAC Tournament against Lenoir-Rhyne set a NCAA II mark at the time, though it lasted just a week. Her 413 strikeouts in 2016 were both school and con-

ference marks as were her career total of 1,355, which ended up eighth on the all-time Division II list.

Tysinger finished her career with a 102-41 record and a 1.27 ERA. Both her win total and ERA set school records. She posted 10 shutouts in three different seasons to set the school mark and finished with 34 in her career. Tysinger also tossed a pair of no-hitters and combined on a third.

In all, Tysinger was named an All-American in each of her four seasons, earning second team honors from the NFCA as a senior. She was twice an Academic All-American. Tysinger was a three-time SAC Pitcher of the Year and the Southeast Region Pitcher of the Year in 2013. She was a four-time All-SAC pick, three on first team, and the 2013 SAC Freshman of the Year.





For football, it was a return to the top after eight years, while baseball and softball repeated their successes from a year ago. Add a tournament co-championship for baseball and it marked the most champions (four) in a single season in a decade.

FOOTBALL

A month into football season, a championship was close to slipping away. Coming off a 17-0 loss to Wingate in rain and on a sloppy field, Catawba was just 2-2 and 1-1 in the South Atlantic Conference. That would be the last loss of the regular season as the Indians reeled off seven straight wins to notch its first title since 2007.

After the Wingate loss, a come-from-behind win over Newberry on another rainy Saturday was followed by a narrow 10-3 victory at Limestone in a third straight game in terrible weather. The Indians cruised to wins over Mars Hill, UNC Pembroke, Brevard and Tusculum to set up a shot at the title at home against defending champ Lenoir-Rhyne.

Trailing 14-7 late in the first half against the Bears, Catawba scored twice in the final two and half minutes before the break to take the momentum. Mike Sheehan capped a 93-yard drive with a short scoring run to tie the game and Case Woodard put Catawba on top to stay with his interception return for a score.

BASEBALL



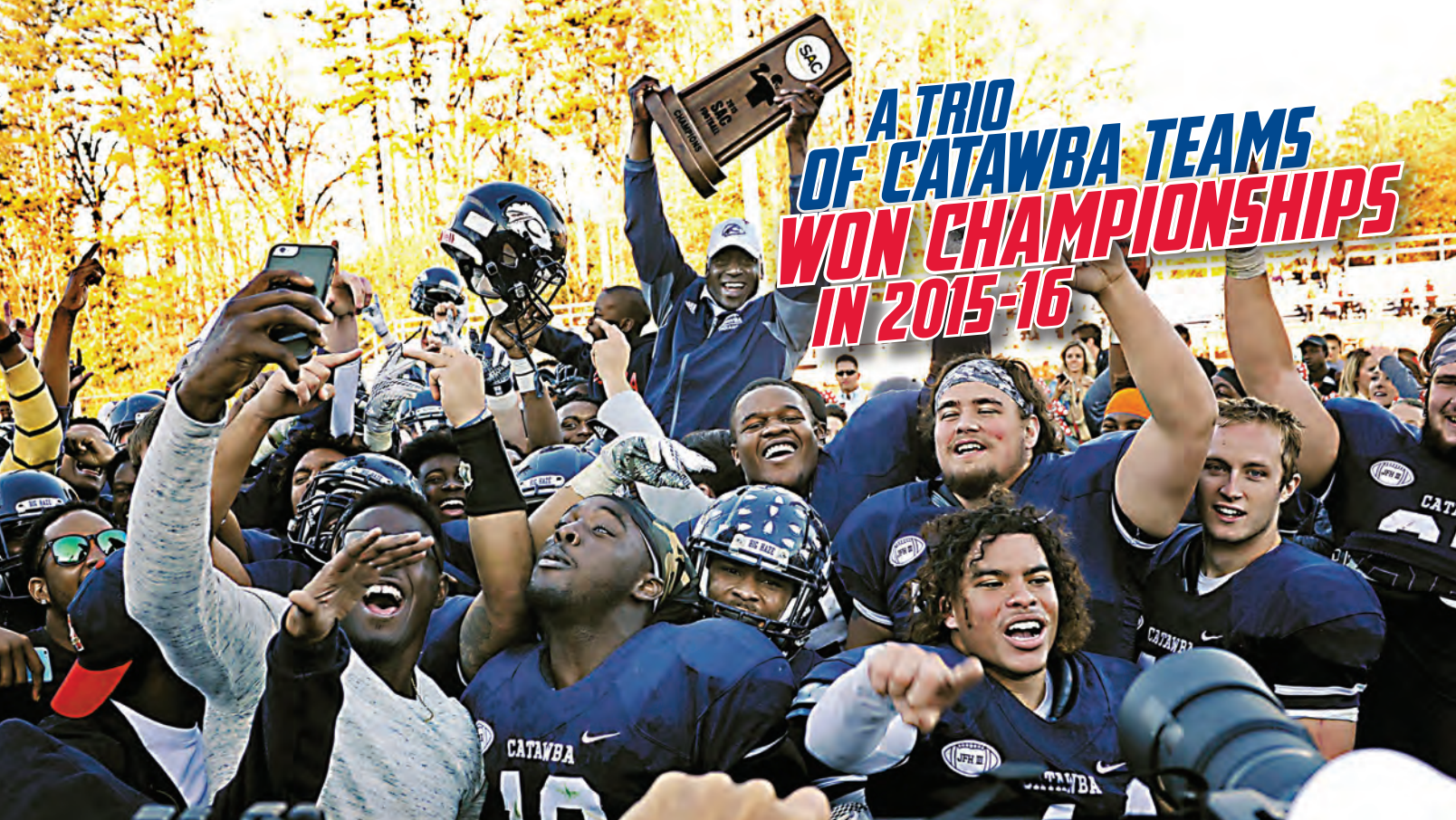
Baseball continued its run of success in the SAC. The team claimed its fourth straight league title, becoming the first school to win four consecutive

championships. It also marked Catawba's 11th in the 27 year history of the league.

At the SAC Tournament, Catawba moved into the final day undefeated and a match-up with Tusculum. After seven innings of the first game, Tusculum led 6-5. That's where the rules of baseball would deny the Indians the outright tourney title.

Down a run, Catawba jumped on the Pioneers with a huge eight run top of the eighth and were set to cruise to the title. With a storm approaching, Catawba was able to get two outs in the bottom of the eighth, but Tusculum was able to extend the inning long enough for the storm to hit.

By the time the rain was over the field was deemed unplayable. With Tusculum unable to complete its full at bat in the bottom of the eighth, baseball rules state that the entire inning is erased. That gave Tusculum a 6-5 win and with both teams having just one loss they were declared co-champions.

SOFTBALL

Softball rode the arm of **CARLEY TYSINGER** to its second straight SAC Tournament title. The Lady Indians put together a remarkable season, going 18-4 in the league. Catawba would drop three of its last four conference games and fell two games short of Lenoir-Rhyne in the regular season.

Catawba would knock of the Bears in the early rounds of the SAC Tournament, but Lenoir-Rhyne battled back to make the championship.

L-R won the first game of the final day to force a winner take all finale. With the game tied and two outs in the bottom of the seventh, **DELANE SMITH** was able to beat out a ground ball with the bases loaded to give Catawba a dramatic 2-1 win and the tournament title.

All three teams would fall in the playoffs.

Football dropped a 26-16 decision to Tusculum and baseball again fought weather issues and lost two close games in the regional. Softball was able to notch an opening win in regional play, but were eliminated with losses to North Georgia and Georgia College.



Bunker Family's Country Playground Dedicated at Catawba College



The July 29, 2016 dedication plaque at Bunker Field on the Catawba College campus reads: “May this space be forever filled with young people having fun.” It also notes that the field, which is part of the Frock Fields Athletic Complex, was given by the D. Nathan, Jr. and Betty Bunker Family of Salisbury, N.C.



But if the plaque could speak, it would tell you so much more about the Bunker Family, its ties to this land, and its ties to Catawba College.

Matriarch Betty Bunker describes the field, adjacent to Grant's Creek, as her family's "country playground." The Bunker Family affectionately referred to it as "The Farm!"

Her son, Dennis, says the five acres were where all of the children in the family "learned a lot of life lessons" and "spent untold hours playing on this land." He notes the games played included mowing grass, gardening, feeding cows and cleaning out the barn which once stood on the property. Dennis also recalls collecting rent and maintaining the five apartment units that used to occupy a section of the property.

Bunker Field, where Catawba's lacrosse teams now practice, came into the Bunker Family in the early 1970s, an acquisition of family patriarch, the late D. Nathan Bunker, Jr. The land was gifted to the College by the Bunker Family in two parcels – one in 1997, the other in 2011, three years before the 2014 death of Nathan Bunker.

Son Dennis calls the gift "visionary," while his sister, Starla Bunker Bennett, says "the gift of this land reflects 60 years

of my parents' belief that education is important."

Betty Bunker, deeply moved by her memories at the July 29th dedication ceremony, says the occasion marked "a very sentimental day for me."

Betty Bunker, the former Betty Tripp of Chapel Hill, shares that she and Nathan Bunker of Chatham County were high school sweethearts who married on December 24, 1953. Nathan was a student at Catawba and working at Cannon Mills when the couple had to make a decision after their marriage about where they would live – Salisbury or Kannapolis. They settled on Salisbury and Nathan commuted to his job in Kannapolis.

The couple saved and sacrificed so Nathan could pursue his college degree, because, as Betty notes, "he was really dedicated to his education." But as their family grew and their children began to arrive, Nathan was unable to finish college.

Nathan enjoyed a career as a real estate investor with other business interests including Bunker Bookstore, one of Salisbury's first bookstores, located where the Walgreens currently stands on W. Innes Street. He also liked growing potatoes and other vegetables in the one-acre family garden on Bunker Field. He would admonish his children to "dig them all up," Betty recalls, even going back over the field with the tractor to make sure no potatoes were left behind.

Betty and Nathan marked their 60th anniversary together before Nathan's death in January of 2014. But if you ask Betty how long she has been married, she will tell you "63 years," and one quickly understands that her relationship with her husband continues despite Nathan's death.

Four children were born to Betty and Nathan – Rise, Dennis, Starla and Tripp. Rise's children, Alex, Daniel and Kristen Lewis, were also raised by the couple as their own, as was David Bunker. In addition to the couple's three surviving children, Nathan and Betty Bunker have six grandchildren (Daniel, Kristen, Alex (d.), Kye, Colin and Carson) and five great-grandchildren, the newest of whom is named Nathan, born in early 2016 to Kristen and Greg Shue.

"When he was born, I couldn't call his name," Betty remembers, "but I do now, and he looks just like Nathan."

At the dedication, College President Brien Lewis spoke about the family's connection to the community and the college. "Bunker Field is a cornerstone of the campus and we are grateful to the generosity of your family in providing this for us."

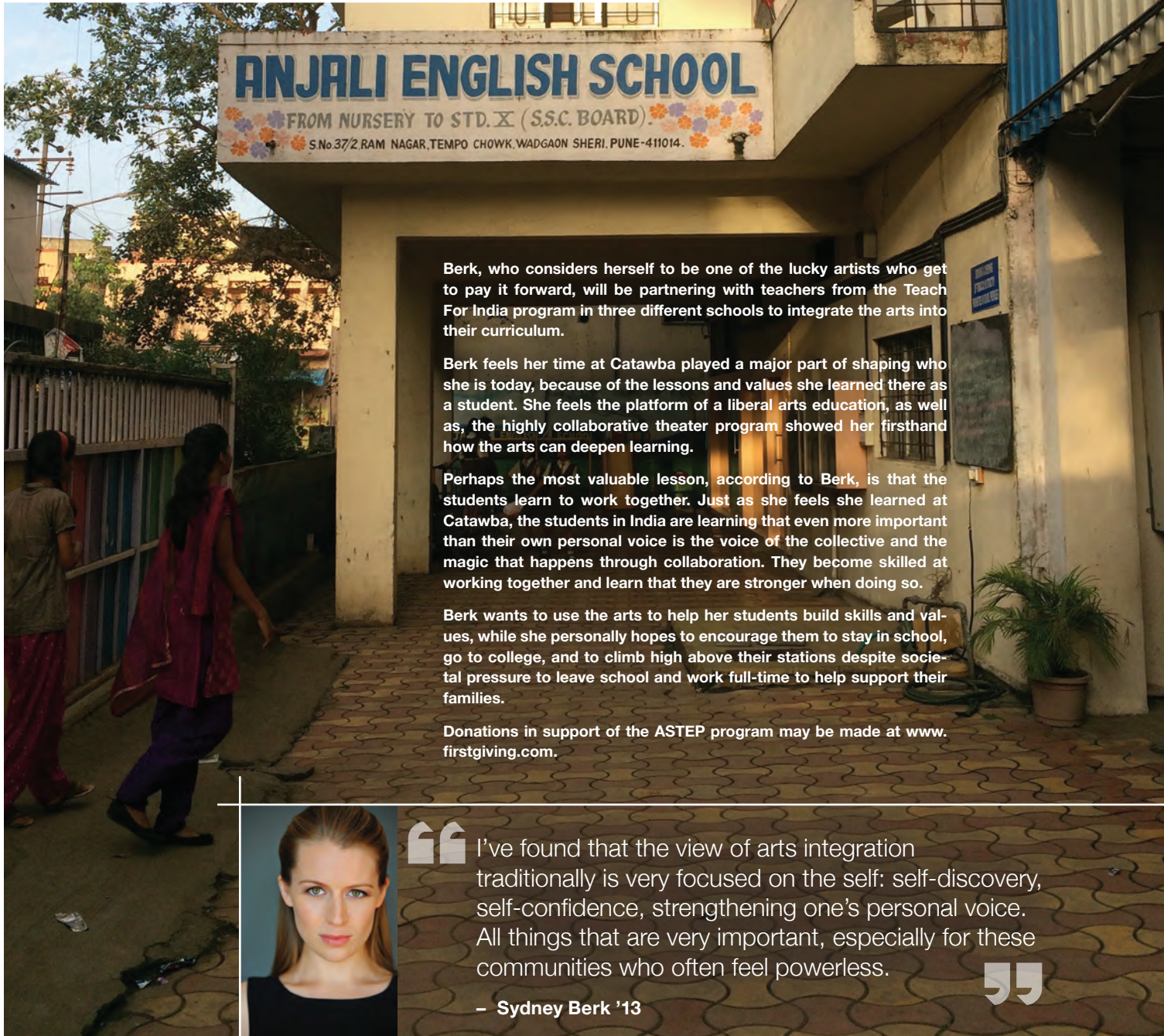
Dennis Bunker said he hopes his family's gift will inspire other families to make similar gifts of property to the college. Noting Catawba's goal of growing its enrollment to 2,400 students by 2025, he said, "The College will need many gifts of land such as this in the College neighborhood in order to accommodate that growth. I hope the College can use this visionary gift from my mom and dad as an example to obtain many other parcels of land for that anticipated growth."

Taught in Pune, India for eight weeks, as part of an initiative by the Artists Striving to End Poverty (ASTEP) organization.



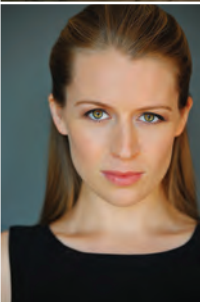
Berk, who considers herself to be one of the lucky artists who get to pay it forward, will be partnering with teachers from the Teach For India program in three different schools to integrate the arts into their curriculum.

Berk feels her time at Catawba played a major part of shaping who she is today, because of the lessons and values she learned there as a student. She feels the platform of a liberal arts education, as well as, the highly collaborative theater program showed her firsthand how the arts can deepen learning.

Perhaps the most valuable lesson, according to Berk, is that the students learn to work together. Just as she feels she learned at Catawba, the students in India are learning that even more important than their own personal voice is the voice of the collective and the magic that happens through collaboration. They become skilled at working together and learn that they are stronger when doing so.

Berk wants to use the arts to help her students build skills and values, while she personally hopes to encourage them to stay in school, go to college, and to climb high above their stations despite societal pressure to leave school and work full-time to help support their families.

While at Catawba, Jim, a Physics major, was very active in student government as well as athletics. He served as the Men's representative, Senator and on the Judicial Board.

He was a stand out in sports also where he excelled in football and baseball. He made All-Conference in baseball as a centerfielder his junior and senior years at Cat U. During his senior year, he was selected to Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

Just after graduation, Jim joined the U.S. Navy where he spent his first four months in flight school (training) as an E-3. In December of 1959, Jim was commissioned as an officer. He was the commanding officer of the West Coast Oceanography facility in San Diego, Calif., when he retired in December 1979 after serving 20 plus years as a naval aviator.

His need to retire followed the unexpected death from a fatal heart attack of Jim's younger brother, Arnold McRee, a 1961 Catawba graduate. 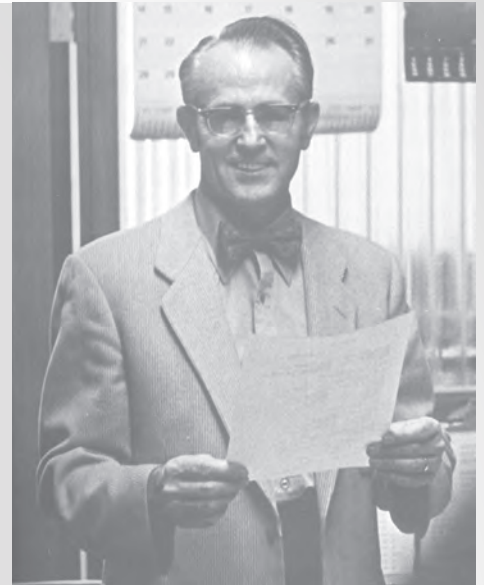

Clarification of Alumnus Remembrance in Fall 2015 CAMPUS

Bill Wilhelm '68 shared a remembrance of late campus pastor, the **Rev. Porter W. Seiwel '35**, in the last edition of CAMPUS. And we need to clarify...

Pastor Seiwel was never a prisoner of war and never served in the military, according to his son, Dick Seiwel '67. He, however, served as a retreat leader during the summers at Camp Michaux, a former POW camp in West Virginia.

Dick shared that his father "would have been highly amused at the mention of being a POW."



Dr. Jay Buxton,

a longtime professor and chair of biology at Catawba, died Tuesday, Oct. 13, 2015 in Hartford, Conn.

Born in Carrara, Italy in 1919, he was a graduate of Southwestern Texas State College, and earned his doctorate in Biology from The Ohio State University, pursuing doctoral studies in the *Melanopolus differentialis*, or the grasshopper. He joined the Catawba faculty in 1967 and served for 20 years until his retirement in 1987. For 19 of his years at Catawba, he served as Chair of the Biology Department.

Prior to joining Catawba, he taught at Clemson University and Texas Arts & Industries University. He often said, "Working with students has been my life," and "teaching has been my greatest satisfaction." In 1987, he noted his former pupils accomplishments: 26 former students who became physicians; 26, medical technologists; six, physician's assistants; 10, chiropractors; two, dentists; four, pharmacists; 10 who earned Ph.D. degrees and of those 10, four who chair departments in major universities; and one college president.

The Department of Biology and the Catawba College chapter of the Tri Beta Biological Honor Society have a medal named in honor of Dr. Buxton (and Dr. Michael Baranski), called the "Buxton and Baranski Biological Honors Medal." This is awarded to Tri Beta members who do a substantial research project and present it at a regional or national conference, exemplifying the mission of Tri Beta. Recipients wear the bronze medals, secured with a green ribbon, at Catawba's commencement ceremony.

He was predeceased by his first wife, Audrey Kennedy Buxton, in 1972. Survivors include his second wife, Elda; three children, Becky, Cindy and Tex; and stepdaughters, Jennifer and Priscilla.

Ralph W. Ketner

September 20, 1920 – May 29, 2016

Food Lion Co-Founder Ralph W. Ketner, the entrepreneur who helped change the landscape of American groceries and build the wealth of his hometown, Salisbury, died May 29, 2016 at age 95.

A longtime trustee of Catawba College, he was passionate about education and hard work. Ralph W. Ketner Hall on the Catawba campus was built thanks to his generosity and was the place he maintained an office that he occupied daily until several months before his death. Catawba's Ketner School of Business is named in his honor.

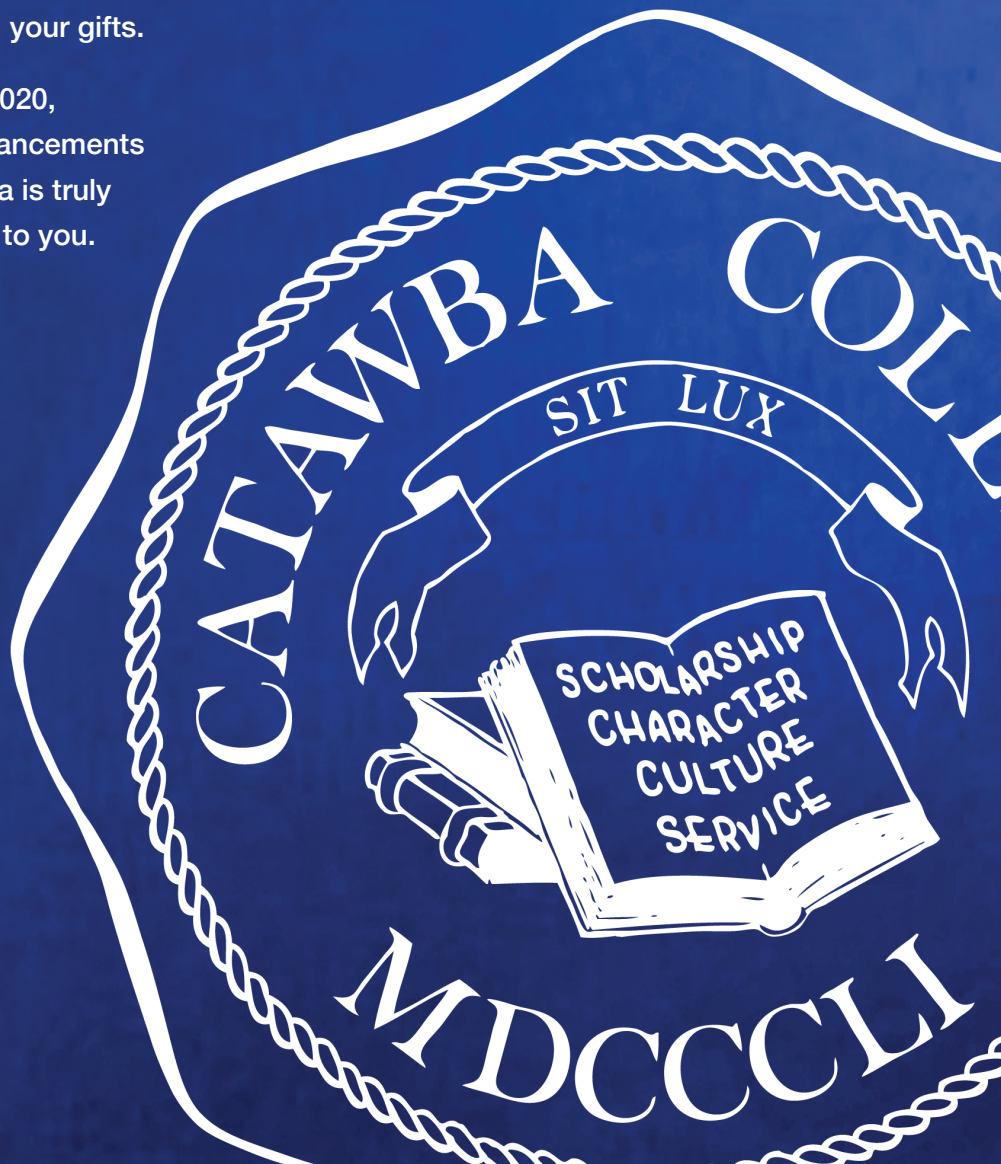

METHODS OF GIVING

Gifts of Cash

The simplest and most common way to support Catawba is a gift of cash which is deductible for income purposes in the year of the contribution.

Gifts of Securities

The contribution of a long-term highly appreciated securities enables you to claim an income tax charitable deduction for the full present market value, and help avoid capital gains tax on the appreciation.

Gifts of Real Estate

An outright gift of real estate enables you to claim an income tax charitable deduction equal to the property's fair market value and remove the property from your estate. This can be done by bequest or during an individual's lifetime. Through the use of a Life Estate Reserved Agreement, an individual can make a charitable gift of real estate and reserve the right to continue to live in the property and realize the tax deduction. Gifts of appreciated real estate help avoid capital gains tax and help avoid estate taxes.

Gifts of Life Insurance

By naming the College as the owner and beneficiary of a paid-up policy, you are entitled to an income tax charitable deduction equal to replacement value or cost basis of the policy, whichever is less. If you continue paying the premiums on a policy donated to Catawba, you may claim the premium amount as an annual tax deduction.

Gifts of Retirement Plans

Created by favorable tax treatment, many retirement plans such as IRA, SEP, and 401(k) plans, can be subject to federal (and perhaps state) estate taxes. Because of their previous favorable tax treatment, these retirement plans are not ideal assets for family members to inherit. By making Catawba College the beneficiary, estate taxes can possibly be avoided.

Charitable Gift Annuity/Deferred Charitable Gift Annuity

A charitable gift annuity is a contract between the donor and Catawba College whereby the donor transfers assets to the college and receives fixed payments for his/her life or for that of another beneficiary. Payments are determined by age at the time of the gift. A deferred charitable gift annuity is much the same as charitable gift annuity, the main difference is the payment is deferred to a later date, normally approaching retirement age. Annuities offer the donor potential income tax savings, capital gains tax savings, and estate tax savings.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

Charitable remainder trusts are life income arrangements whereby assets are gifted to the trusts, which in turn pays the donor or his/her beneficiary an income for life. The donated assets can be cash, securities, or property, and at the time of the gift, potential tax reduction benefits pass to the donor. After the death of the last income beneficiary, the trust assets revert to Catawba to be used according to the donor's prior wishes.

Charitable Lead Trust

Charitable Lead Trust is an agreement in which a donor places assets in a trust and gives the college the income interest for a period of years. At the end of that term, the assets are returned to the designated beneficiary(s). This agreement can greatly reduce estate and gift tax costs when making gifts to children, grandchildren, or other non-charitable beneficiaries.

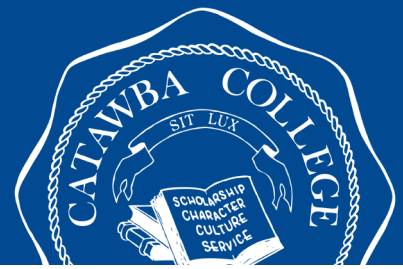
