Many of you, alumni and friends of campus ministry and the Lilly Center, know the walk of our students. You too felt the pull of that light in your lives. We want you to know how that work is still happening. In this newsletter you will hear of the ways we are serving students through meaningful worship, volunteer opportunities and the building of community here at Catawba. You will hear of the ways we are forming young theologians in the Discover program and helping clergy thrive in ministry through the Catawba Clergy Network. We want to celebrate this work with you, and we are grateful for you, as you all are the legacy of our work in the world.

Day of Service

On September 13, 2023 Catawba College embarked on a historic journey by hosting the first-ever Day of Service. It was an event that embodied the college's unwavering commitment to community engagement and a culture for service.

Throughout this day over 481 Catawba students, faculty, and staff came together to serve the Rowan County community through a multitude of projects in collaboration with 23 community partners. The monumental occasion signified a significant milestone for Catawba College as it marked the birth of the first "Pillar Day," signaling the beginning of a new tradition deeply rooted in the College's identity.

Activities for the Day of Service included a wide range of volunteer opportunities, including tutoring and mentoring students, local food bank and shelter support, park cleanups, tree planting, beautification projects, and senior citizen outreach. More than 1,028 service hours were generated over the course of this day alone. This inaugural Day of Service was a huge success thanks to the hard work of Johnathon Boles, the director of Volunteer Catawba.

Catawba is truly living out its commitment to service and inspiring the next generation of change makers.

Alternative Spring Break

In March 2023, eight Catawba students revived the college's tradition of using spring break for service by visiting Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, MS. Affiliated with the United Church of Christ, Back Bay Mission serves the unsheltered through various activities. The alternative spring break trip profoundly impacted the students, shaping their perspectives on service, homelessness, climate change, and civil rights. Engaging in daily service activities, such as assisting at the Micah Day Center and participating in construction work, the students found the experience transformative. Evenings were filled with diverse programming, including worship, sessions on climate change and civil rights, and reflection time. The students formed lasting friendships with Heidelberg University students. This spring break, a group from Catawba plans to return to Back Bay Mission with Heidelberg University, thanks to the support of the National United Church of Christ and generous donors who are passionate about fostering a culture for service at Catawba.





Student Service Leaders

Creating a culture of service on and off our campus is core to the Catawba identity. We are a people who serve. Students are eager to engage in service and help lead their peers. In the Spring semester of 2024 we are going to work intentionally with four students as Service Scholars who will partner with community leaders to coordinate service opportunities for our college, recruiting and inspiring their classmates to serve. These Service Scholars will also receive leadership training and opportunities for reflection.

We have noticed economic barriers to service as Catawba brings in increasing numbers of students who are of high financial need. The Lilly Center is committed to service not being exclusively for the affluent. We have students working jobs to allow for their basic needs at Catawba or to send money home to family members. It is inspiring that these students still want to find time to serve. Borrowing from the Bonner program model, this program will compensate students for their service allowing us to select students with a deep passion for service apart from financial ability. We are in the trial phase of this program and are excited for the ways this could transform our students and campus culture through service.

Freshmen Retreats

This signature program of the college has been offered for over 20 years and has contributed greatly to the formation of many Catawba students. We are working across departments to explore how these retreats might be integrated into the freshmen experience for all students, not just a self-selecting few. How can every student be given the opportunity to frame their entire college experience around these deep questions; "who am I," "what do I value," "what gifts do I have," and "how can those be lived in the world." These are questions that will help our students have a groundedness in who they are so that as occupations change, which they will, their sense of vocation, calling, will remain steadfast. Beginning a student's time at Catawba with these questions helps to prime them for what is to come in the next four years, an education that will give them the tools needed to succeed and also the framework to live a meaningful life. We are working to build out this program, knowing that a goal of full freshmen participation is ambitious, but we also believe in the ways that this message is counter cultural and essential to our student's formation.

Discover is one of about 200 youth theology programs at colleges and seminaries across the country. These programs emphasize faith development through study of scripture, theological reflection, and vocational discernment. Discover does this through a different theme each summer, as well as through practical theology tracks. These tracks give students the opportunity to reflect on how God might be calling them through their various gifts, skills, and interests. In past years we've had tracks in sport management, worship music, and service and ministry leadership, and this year we debuted a science track, which focused on how the skills of science-like asking questions and paying close attention, can help us to grow in our faith. Students explored chemistry, biology, environmental science and environmental advocacy all through a lens of faith. Some highlights were visiting a local organic farm for a session with a Catawba graduate and using natural indigo to dye our Discover t-shirts (pictured above).

All of these experiences are a part of a program that encourages exploration of self, God, and creation, as we each seek to discern what we are called to do with our "one wild and precious life."

Discover's leadership is in a time of transition, but we have two more years of funding through a matching grant from the Lilly Endowment.
